HAZARD COMMUNICATION

One of the most important pieces of hazard communication are Safety Data Sheets. According to OSHA, SDSs are required to be maintained at the jobsite. A complete file of SDSs, for all hazardous chemicals to, which employees may be exposed to, will be kept in labeled binders at each job site. SPOTTER AWARENESS

Using a spotter when operating equipment ensures that operators have a complete picture of their surroundings to keep clear of any objects, people, or dangers. Spotters must be attentive and keep the operator informed of any changes within the site as well as communicate to help operators safely maneuver. Before beginning it is imperative to make sure there is a plan between the operator and spotter and there is a clear understanding of what exactly you are doing and where you are going. You should agree on hand signals as well as the travel route.
